DSW Students Participate in We Inspire Week!

During the week of November 18, 2024, students and faculty in the <u>Developmental Services</u> Worker (DSW) program at Humber Polytechnic, and colleges across the province, celebrated the annual WE Inspire Week – WE Inspire Advocacy!

WE Inspire Week is dedicated to honoring the work of developmental services professionals and DSW students across Ontario. This year's theme was advocacy, and our students and faculty engaged in discussions about advocacy across various courses, exploring how students, as future professionals, can become effective advocates.

On Thursday, November 21, 2024, developmental services professionals and individuals with lived experience joined our second-year students, faculty, and community guests for a panel presentation organized by DSW Program faculty Andrea Rutherford and Mackenzie Ketchell. The panel, titled "Changing the Narrative on Life Trajectories: From Advocacy to Employment," focused on employment for people with developmental disabilities and their lived experiences. This event provided students with valuable insights into the positive impact employment has on the lives of people with developmental disabilities and highlighted the role they can play in supporting job seekers. Addictions & Mental Health Thesis Showcase

On Thursday, December 5, 2024, the fourth year <u>Bachelor of Social Sciences – Addictions and Mental Health (BAMH)</u> students showcased their research projects on contemporary, emerging and re-emerging issues in the field of addictions and mental health in the G-Commons. Some topics included: Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD) for Mental Illness, Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls, 2-Spirit People and Mental Health, Closure of Safe Injection Sites in Toronto, Social Media and Consumerism Addiction, Self-Diagnosis on Social Media, and Psychedelics and the Treatment of Trauma.

Faculty and staff from various departments and services attended the event and took on the role of reviewers. Students and reviewers engaged in critical discussion on their topics including practice application to the field, EDIB considerations, interdisciplinary relevance and application, and contemporary shifts and changes in the field of mental health and addictions.

In this position, Stephanie will contribute the students' point of view and pose general questions to the Board in her role as a future practitioner in the field of applied behaviour analysis. Stephanie will also prepare brief reports on what ONTABA is working on during her tenure on the Board and these reports will be distributed to all our BBS students.

Stephanie is following in the footsteps of BBS student Solanch Speranza Baro who was an undergraduate student representative in 2022/2023 and now chairs the ONTABA committee on organizational development.

Students in the BBS Program Attend ONTABA Conference

Three students from the Bachelor of Behavioural Science (BBS) program attended the annual conference of the Ontario Association of Behaviour Analysis on October 7, 2024, in Toronto. This provided the students with the opportunity to hear presentations by various speakers on the cutting edge of Applied Behaviour Analysis and view research poster presentations by master's level students in the field.

One student reported: "From attending ONTABA, I learned that learning is an ongoing process, and that Applied Behaviour Analysis is an evolving field. It has much to offer, and it will continue to grow and gain recognition in our society. Towards the end of the day, we spent time talking with others in the field, which was a great opportunity to build connections and get to know new people."





Police Foundations Program Participates in Multiple Inter-collegiate Challenges & Events

PFP had a busy Fall 2024 semester! On September 28, Semester 3 <u>Police Foundations (PFP)</u> students took part in the <u>Rescue Weekend Mass Casualty Inter-professional Education (IPE)</u> event at the North campus. In collaboration with the Faculty of Health Sciences and Wellness, students engaged in a mass crisis simulation with multiple programs, including <u>Paramedic</u>, <u>Emergency Telecommunications</u>, <u>Nursing</u>, <u>Pre- Service Firefighter Education and Training</u>, and <u>Exercise Science and Lifestyle Management</u>. As a part of the simulation, PFP faculty Frank Doto and Peter Iskander taught students how to direct traffic, manage witnesses and bystanders, and support the victims of the mass vehicle collision and service providers in responding to the scene.

For the first time ever, 10 of our Semester 3 PFP students engaged in the Before the Badge Program with Peel Regional Police Services. The six-week internship program was held at Peel Regional Police headquarters and participants from Humber and Sheridan Police Foundations programs learned practical skills in policing. Alexandre Boucher Memorial Lecture October 16, 2024

FSCS held the 8th annual Alexandre Boucher memorial lecture on October 16, 2024. This year the Faculty of Social and Community Services welcomed back Jhanelle Peters, Registered Psychotherapist with the College of Registered Psychotherapists of Ontario (CRPO), to speak with students, staff and faculty about managing stress and anxiety. Having worked in Canada and the United States, Jhanelle has connected with individuals from diverse populations helping them uncover negative patterns and behaviours that make life challenging. Through her diverse experience as a Sports Psychology Coordinator for the Athletics Department of Pepperdine University, and as the former Mental Health Clinician for the Toronto Raptors, Jhanelle's lecture provided insight on identifying and developing self-care strategies to reduce anxiety and promote positive self-talk.

The Annual Alexandre Boucher Memorial Lecture takes place during Mental Health Awareness month. It is an event held in memory of Criminal Justice Degree student Alexandre Boucher, to raise awareness and provide support to the Humber community.



Ontario College Fair October 16 & 17, 2024

Career Mentorship Program

The Career Mentorship Program (CMP) is a WIL program uniquely offered to Faculty of Social and Community Services (FSCS) students in the Police Foundations (PFP) and Protection, Security, and Investigation (PSI) programs. The CMP connects soon-to-graduate students with an industry-based mentor currently employed in the mentee's desired future career.

Occurring over 3, 1-hour sessions, students and mentors build a professional relationship while discussing relevant and emerging industry topics and trends, the steps that students need to take to embark on their desired future career, and hand-tailored advice that can provide students with an inside perspective to their mentor's industry. The CMP offers PFP and PSI students with tangible industry experience prior to their graduation and entry into the field. Over the last academic year, the CMP has over doubled in participation and continues to expand!

Humber Students Study Abroad This Summer

Summer offers Humber students a unique opportunity to gain one elective credit abroad, through one of Humber's international academic partners. This summer 80 students from across Humber participated in programs across the world, such as Digital Business Innovation, UN Sustainable Development Goals and Co-Creation, Learning Osaka, Sustainable Marketing, "Our Canoe is Our Island, Our Island is Our Canoe", and more.

Students from the Faculty of Social and Community Services went to Germany, England, Hawai'i, Denmark and Japan. This incredible experience changes year to year, with programs and countries available expanding every summer. It offers students who may not be able to go on a semester exchange a chance to travel for academic credit during a shorter period of time - from 2 to 4 weeks - during the summer, making it more accessible to many of our students. A travel bursary offered through Humber Global also supported students to be able to attend.













Global Summer School

This summer, <u>Global Summer School (GSS)</u> returned again! Each Faculty at Humber offered one course for elective credit. This year the Faculty of Social and Community Services ran the course Human Rights, Diversity and Social Inclusion for the first time.

Along with taking a Humber class, and fulfilling an elective credit in just three weeks, students also had the option to participate in a range of fun social activities, including tree-top trekking, a Blue Jay's game, a boat party on Lake Ontario, river rafting, Canada's Wonderland, and a trip to Niagara Falls.





Over 220 students attended GSS 2024, 175 of which came for this opportunity from abroad! Students joined from Argentina, Barbados, Brazil, Brunei, Bhutan, Costa Rica, Denmark, Fiji, Germany, Japan, Kenya, Indonesia, Mexico, the Netherlands, Nigeria, the Philippines, Republic of Ireland, Taiwan, Thailand, the U.S.A, and the U.K. (England, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales)! Research & Innovation



Congratulations to Addictions and Mental Health faculty member, Shivon Raghunandan, on her recent publication!

In 2024 Bachelor of Social Science – Addictions and Mental Health faculty Shivon Raghunandan published an article with co-author Roy Moodley in the Journal of Couple and Relationship Therapy. Their study "The Lived Experiences of Interracial Couples: Racialized Experiences, Reconciling Differences, and Engendered Strengths," explored the lived experiences of heterosexual, Racialized-White couples with regards to issues of race and culture as couples crossed socially constructed racial and cultural boundaries.

Congratulations to <u>Bachelor of Child</u> <u>and Youth Care</u> faculty member Janet Seow on her recent publications!

BCYC faculty member Janet Rosemary Seow published the chapter "Black Canadian Children's Literature: Evolution. Writers, and Impact," in The Routledge Handbook of Black Canadian Literature (2024). Seow's chapter delves into Black Canadian children's literature, its development over more than 60 years, and the influential writers who have defined the genre. It examines stories that reflect the diverse experiences of Black childhood, as narrated by both Black Canadians and African immigrants who have made Canada their home. The Routledge Handbook of Black Canadian Literature was edited by Leslie Sanders and Andrea A. Davis.

In 2025 Seow will be publishing an article in the inter-disciplinary academic journal Jeunesse: Young People, Texts, and Cultures. "Black Youth Reading for Pleasure in Alternative Spaces" addresses the notable gap in understanding the pleasure reading interests of Black youth in Toronto, with even less known about the preferences of Black nerds. Research on the reading interests of Black youth and the impact



of intersectionality on their lives and choices is limited. Studies focusing on Black literature often emphasize trend analysis and the scarcity of books promoting diversity.

This article provides a unique perspective on an important subcultural group and their engagement with pleasure reading. It is based on qualitative participatory research conducted with Black youth aged 16-25 in Toronto, Canada.

At Humber's Centre for Social Innovation (CSI), we're bringing together students, faculty, and community partners to address systemic challenges and foster positive outcomes across a wide variety of issue areas. We continue to take on many new and diverse projects, helping community groups and organizations grow towards their impact goals! HOUSING DISPLACEMENT

CommuniACTION Social Hack-a-thon: The Centre for Social Innovation and Longo's Centre for Entrepreneurship at Humber Polytechnic are co-hosting their second annual social hack-a-thon. Last year's theme focused on food security (the InnovEAT Challenge) in partnership with Daily Bread. This year, student teams will be asked to come up with creative solutions to community displacement due to development.

Applications for Humber students to join the challenge closed in January. Accepted students were invited to join us at the kick-off event on Saturday, January 25, 2025 to learn more about the issue with our community partner, CP Planning, and work on case and pitch skills with Longo's Centre for Entrepreneurship. The challenge is a great chance for students to hone their problem-solving skills, work with peers, and compete for monetary prizes (\$325 honorarium per student). CSI cont'd next page...

Map the System at Humber: Map the System (MTS) at Humber is now part of the CSI family of projects. The team of faculty from FLAS are looking to grow with more student and faculty participants, and we're leading that charge with them! MTS is a global competition led by the Skoll Centre for Social Entrepreneurship at Oxford University and Humber has been participating for over five years. Last year, the first-place prize in the Canadian national-level competition was captured by Chandra (Nat) Limiarja, a Humber student in the Research Analyst Program, in the Faculty of Liberal Arts & Sciences (FLAS). We continue to encourage faculty and students to get involved by integrating it into the classroom, being mentors, or participating in Humber's local Map the System competition for 2025 or in the future. Humber Polytechnic's Annual Employee Holiday Party



We thank all those who donated food and gift items to our local communities, as well as the departments and faculties who contributed prizes for our donation raffle draw.



Lakeshore Grounds Interpretive Centre has
renewed Grace: One Story of Thousands for
the 2024-2025 academic year. Launched
in 2023, the exhibition chronicles the life
of a woman named Grace, one of the 1511
people buried in the Lakeshore Psychiatric
Hospital cemetery at the corner of Horner
and Evans Avenues. The exhibition shares
personal letters and hospital records from



Grace's incarceration in the Hamilton Asylum, and were gathered and shared for this display by Grace's great-niece, Marg Tumilty.
